Jill's Story

For Jill, home has always been the center of everything. She bought her house years ago when her oldest child was just a toddler, and it has been where her family has grown and stayed rooted.

Jill is the mother of five children—four biological and one adopted—and recently became the legal guardian of another child who joined her family after the child's mother passed away. While other placement options existed, the child wanted one thing above all else: a home. And that home was with Jill.

But aging plumbing and a failing roof threatened the stability Jill had worked so hard to build.

Through NeighborWorks® Boise's Meridian Homeowner Repair Program, critical repairs were completed to make the home safe and stable again — helping ensure Jill's family could remain together in the place they call home.

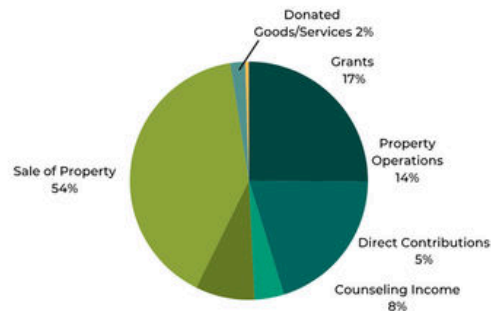

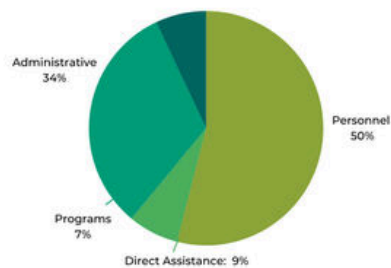

At NeighborWorks® Boise, our work is guided by a simple goal: helping people achieve and maintain stable housing.

This work is carried out through a coordinated approach that expands homeownership opportunities, preserves existing homes so families can remain safely housed, and strengthens housing stability through affordable housing and supportive services.

Every dollar entrusted to NeighborWorks® Boise is used to support this work. Through careful financial stewardship, strong partnerships, and transparent reporting, we ensure resources are used effectively and responsibly to expand housing opportunities across Idaho.

This work is only possible because of the continued support of donors, public partners, volunteers, and community organizations who believe a home truly changes everything.

Impact at a Glance



Across our programs, NeighborWorks® Boise is expanding homeownership opportunities, preserving existing homes, and strengthening housing stability across the Treasure Valley.

In 2025:

- **212 households** received affordable rental housing
- **42 households** completed homebuyer education and counseling
- **19 homes** were rehabilitated or repaired, helping homeowners remain safely housed
- **8 newly built homes** in the Cole Bluff Cottages Pocket Neighborhood™ were purchased, expanding access to affordable homeownership
- **289 youth and 332 adults** were empowered through Resident Services
- **580 households** served through Paint The Town™ and Rake Up Boise™
- **4,000+ volunteers** contributed nearly **9,000 hours** of service

Together, these efforts support hundreds of families each year while strengthening neighborhoods across the Treasure Valley—ensuring more neighbors have a safe, stable place to call home.



As housing costs rise and eviction filings continue to increase across the region, the need for safe, stable, and affordable housing has never been greater. NeighborWorks® Boise continues to expand how we serve our community — strengthening pathways to homeownership, growing our housing portfolio, and deepening support for residents.

We are advancing our development pipeline, including a 5-plex currently under construction, additional 5-plex and 6-plex projects in planning, and seven single-family homes with detached garages in development, in addition to other projects across various stages of development to meet growing demand across the Treasure Valley.

Our Homeownership CenterSM is increasing access to education and counseling by offering classes in Nampa, Meridian, and virtual settings, while broadening outreach to community partners, veteran organizations, and rural communities.

We are also expanding community engagement efforts, connecting neighbors to resources, support, and one another. Ongoing outreach is helping more volunteers participate in Paint The Town™ and Rake Up Boise™, growing the community support that makes this work possible.

This work is made possible through strong partnerships with cities, lenders, employers, and community organizations across the Treasure Valley.

Homeownership Preparation and Support

NeighborWorks® Boise prepares families for homeownership through education, counseling, and lending support designed to build confidence and long-term financial stability. Together, these services create a clear pathway to homeownership, from preparation to purchase.

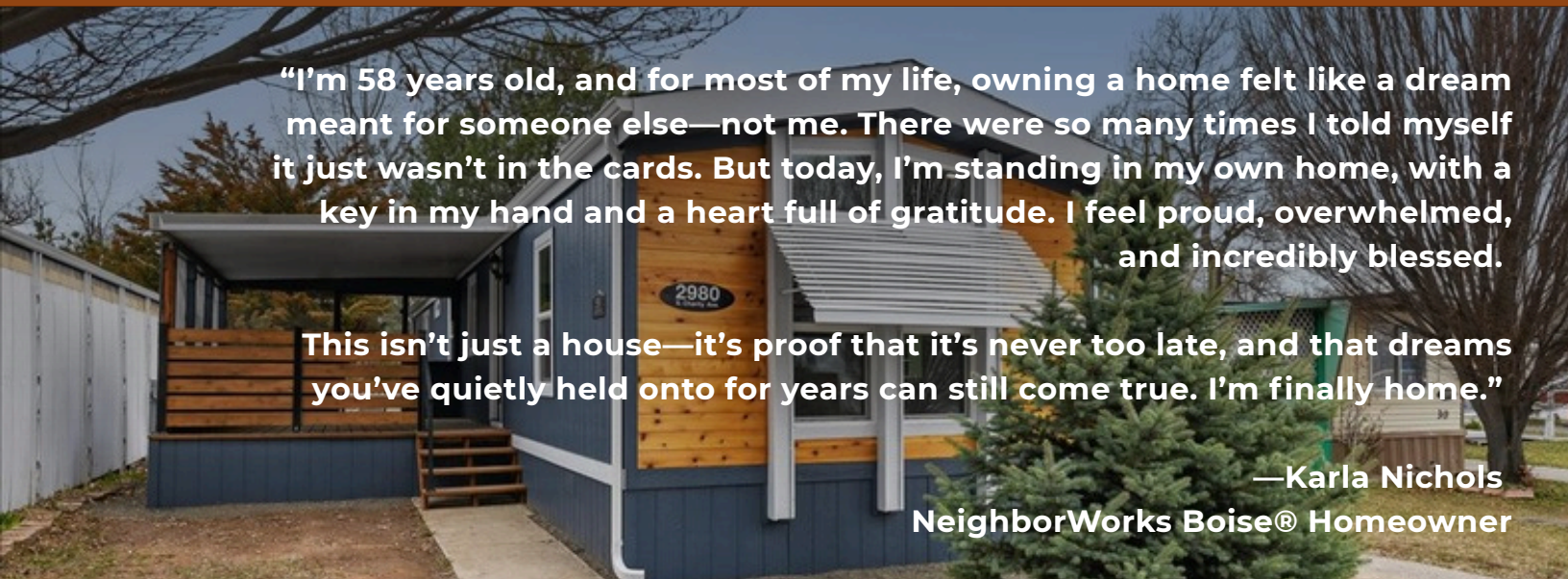

Katy's Story



From Preperation to Homeownership

For Katy, homeownership once felt out of reach. As a single mom raising two young daughters, she struggled to find a safe, affordable home in a market that often felt out of reach for families at lower income levels. Like many in the Boise region, she believed homeownership simply was not possible.

That changed when she connected with NeighborWorks® Boise, where she accessed education, counseling, and ultimately secured her home through a NeighborWorks® Boise loan.

Encouraged by her sister, Katy enrolled in the Homebuyer Education course and began working one-on-one through Pre-purchase Counseling. With guidance from our HUD-certified counselors and support from the mortgage lending team, she navigated the path to homeownership step by step.

Through this process, Katy qualified for a loan and received down payment assistance through a partnership with Idaho Housing and Finance Association — helping make homeownership possible for her family.

In 2025, Katy and her daughters moved into their new home in our Cole Bluff Cottages Pocket Neighborhood™.

For her daughters, the change was immediate. They were able to choose their own rooms, pick paint colors, and decorate their own space — something they had never experienced before.

For Katy, it was the simple things that mattered most.

Creating Homeowners

The Elom Family

When the Elom family first connected with NeighborWorks® Boise, they were living in a mold-infested, one-bedroom apartment. With five people sharing a single space, stability felt out of reach.

They began by completing Homebuyer Education and working one-on-one through Pre-purchase Counseling to prepare for homeownership. Through NeighborWorks® Boise's Mortgage Lending Department, they secured down payment assistance through Idaho Housing and Finance Association HOME funds, enabling them to purchase a newly built home in our Cole Bluff Cottages Pocket Neighborhood™.

In 2025, the family moved into their new home — gaining space, safety, and a foundation for the future. Today, the family is safely and stably housed—an example of how homeownership creates lasting opportunity.

Preserving Homes, Protecting Stability

For many homeowners, a safe and stable home can be at risk when critical repairs become too costly to manage alone. NeighborWorks® Boise helps preserve homeownership by providing essential repairs that allow residents to remain safely housed, maintain independence, and protect the long-term value of their homes.

Through programs like the Meridian Homeowner Repair Program, NeighborWorks® Boise supports homeowners with repairs focused on safety, accessibility, energy efficiency, and long-term habitability.

These programs serve households earning at or below 80% of Area Median Income (AMI) and are designed to ensure that unexpected repairs do not force families out of the homes they have worked hard to achieve.

From replacing failing HVAC systems and repairing roofs to installing accessibility features like ramps and grab bars, these improvements help homeowners remain safely housed and age in place with dignity.

These repairs not only improve homes—they help protect long-term housing stability for the residents we serve.

For one Meridian family, failing plumbing caused leaks, poor air quality, and ongoing stress. Repairs through the Meridian Home Repair Program restored a safe, healthy, and stable home.

Preserving Homes, Strengthening Community



For 43 years, Paint The Town™ has been NeighborWorks® Boise's signature community event. This year, NeighborWorks® Boise placed special focus on supporting veteran homeowners through Paint The Town™.

Among those served were John Kellner, a Vietnam veteran and retired Idaho Power employee, and Richard Shelvock, a Navy veteran.

Volunteers from Idaho Power painted John's home, helping complete a project that had become difficult for him to manage on his own.

At Richard's home, volunteers from HDR Engineering spent the day painting while Richard visited with the team outside as they worked.

"We've got 12-15 people here working, volunteering their time to look out for us."

Alesha Willis of the HDR volunteer team shared that this was their 20th year participating and that 2025 felt especially meaningful, as the team was able to support a veteran neighbor and give back in return for his service.

Russ Weedon of Idaho Power, who has been with the company for nearly 35 years, shared that Idaho Power has supported Paint The Town™ for decades. Having participated himself for many years, he noted that this was the first time he recalls the team being able to give back to a former Idaho Power employee—making the project especially meaningful.

Partnership in Action

Not every home is ready for painting. In past years, NeighborWorks® Boise was often forced to turn away applicants whose homes required critical repairs before volunteers could begin.

In recent years, that has changed for some. Through a strong partnership with Treasure Valley Habitat for Humanity—and with support from dedicated donors—select homes now receive necessary repairs before being brought forward for Paint The Town™. This makes it possible for more homeowners to experience the full impact of the program and see their homes painted. In 2025, seven homes received critical repairs through this partnership, ensuring safe, stable conditions prior to painting.

For David, a disabled U.S. Marine Corps veteran who served two tours in Iraq, that support made a meaningful difference. For years, he felt weighed down by the condition of his home, including water-damaged siding, along with personal challenges.

Being selected for the program brought a renewed sense of hope.

Community in Action



Each fall, NeighborWorks® Boise coordinates Rake Up Boise™, a community-wide volunteer effort that helps seniors, veterans, and neighbors with disabilities prepare their homes for winter. Volunteer teams rake leaves, clear yards, and help ensure walkways remain safe as the season changes.

In 2025, NeighborWorks® Boise proudly celebrated the program's 40th anniversary, marking four decades of neighbors showing up to support one another across the Treasure Valley.

From students, corporate teams, and community groups to longtime volunteers who return year after year, thousands of volunteers come together to serve their community. For many, it is also a meaningful opportunity for corporate team-building while giving back locally. Teams from Meridian Technical Charter School's National Honor Society described the day as "raking, bagging, laughing, and helping our Boise neighbors get their yards ready for winter," calling it one of their favorite traditions.

For homeowners like LeRue Pettibone, who is nearly 90 years old, the impact is immediate.

"They did a fantastic job—took the weeds out and everything! I'm almost 90 years old, and they have done such an amazing job. I'm so grateful for [the volunteers] for their wonderful help."

Rake Up Boise™ helps homeowners remain safely housed and age in place with dignity by supporting outdoor chores they may no longer be able to manage on their own — ensuring neighbors can continue living safely in the homes they love.

For many, the impact goes beyond a clean yard.

"It helps me age in place."

After four decades, Rake Up Boise™ continues to strengthen neighborhoods and support older adults — reflecting the heart of the program: neighbors helping neighbors.

Delivering Housing Stability

In 2025, NeighborWorks® Boise managed three multifamily housing communities, the Melodee Thornton Mobile Home Park, and multiple scattered-site properties across the Treasure Valley. Through integrated property management, maintenance, and Resident Services, these communities provide both affordable housing and a range of rental options—creating a foundation for long-term housing stability.

Stable housing is not only about access—it is about maintaining that housing over time. Through strong operations, high occupancy, and coordinated support services, NeighborWorks® Boise helps ensure residents can remain housed, connected, and supported.

Affordable Housing Portfolio

- 276 total units across three multifamily communities, a mobile home park, and scattered-site properties
- Serving households earning at or below 30–80% of Area Median Income (AMI)
- High, stable occupancy rates reflecting strong demand and effective property management



Stability at Home

Emebet's Story

Emebet, a refugee from Ethiopia, has lived at the Davis Park Apartment community for seven years, where she and her family have found more than housing—they have found stability and community.

During that time, her family has grown, and they have built strong connections through Resident Services programs, including youth activities and community gatherings that bring neighbors together.

In the summer months, the community becomes especially active, creating opportunities for families to connect and support one another.

For Emebet, having a safe and stable home has created opportunities for her family to grow and look toward the future.

Stability Beyond the Front Door



In 2025, Resident Services supported an estimated 276 households across NeighborWorks® Boise's affordable housing communities.

Resident Services are embedded within these communities, connecting residents to the resources and support needed to remain stably housed. Programs focus on reducing barriers that can lead to housing instability, including food insecurity, financial challenges, and social isolation.

With the addition of a new Resident Services Coordinator in late 2025, services expanded to meet growing community needs—offering food access, youth programs, financial education, and community-building activities.

NeighborWorks® Boise food pantries continue to play a critical role, serving more than 1,500 neighbors during the winter months alone, when the need for support is greatest.

These efforts help residents maintain housing stability, strengthen community connections, and reduce the risk of displacement.

This work is made possible by dedicated volunteers and community partners like Rolling Tomato, whose generosity helps ensure families have reliable access to healthy food and essential resources.

Neighbors helping neighbors is at the core of what we do. It is what started NeighborWorks® Boise more than 40 years ago—and it continues to guide and sustain our work today.

Volunteers power this work at every level. Pantry volunteers and community partner Rolling Tomato help keep shelves stocked and neighbors supported each week. Volunteers also lead Resident Services classes in art, nutrition, cooking, and financial education—creating opportunities for connection, learning, and stability within our communities.

Industry professionals share their expertise through homebuyer education and counseling, helping individuals and families prepare for successful homeownership. Across the Treasure Valley, thousands of volunteer hours are donated through Paint The Town™ and Rake Up Boise™, where neighbors come together to support seniors, veterans, and neighbors with disabilities.

Corporate groups and community partners contribute through special projects in our multifamily communities, while dedicated weekly volunteers provide essential support in our offices and across programs.

A home changes everything—and none of this work would be possible without the volunteers who make it happen every day. Their time, talent, and commitment help ensure more neighbors have access to safe, stable housing and the opportunity to build a stronger future.
